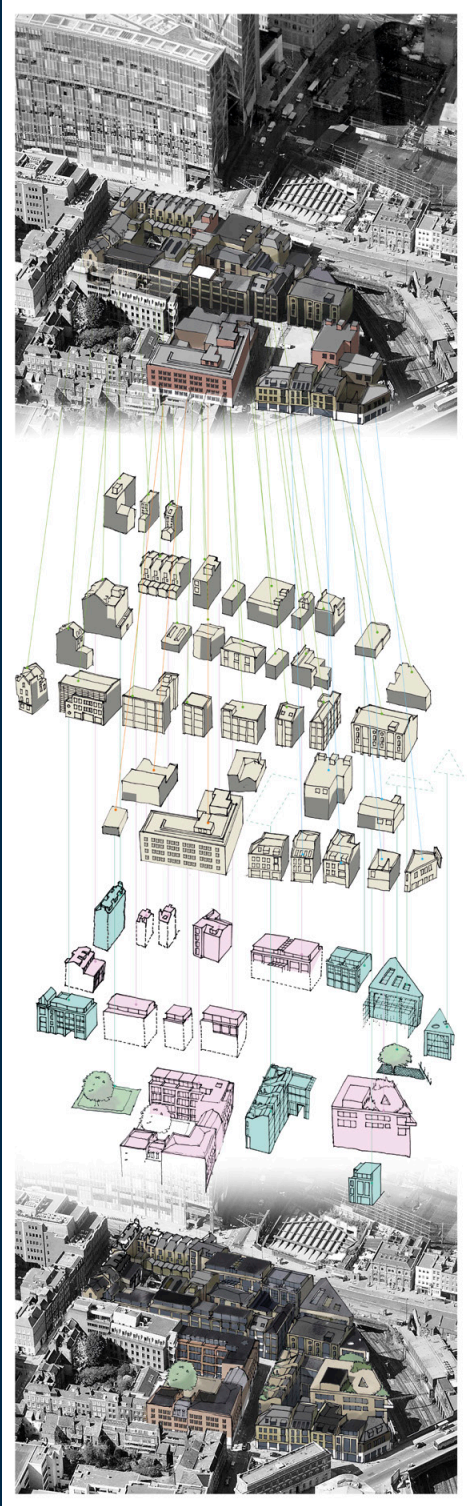


Our vision for the future of Norton Folgate

Our new buildings will respect local styles of architecture in form and materials. Where necessary, we will make discreet additions to existing buildings to improve, update and enhance them.

Our completed ensemble of buildings will conserve and enrich the life of Norton Folgate.

Our alternative proposal has been developed in collaboration with John Burrell of Burrell Foley Fischer, Architects & Urban Designers

In some infill sites, where good quality earlier buildings were known to exist, these will be reproduced from historic records and in other sites, where it is more appropriate, well-designed contemporary buildings, drawing upon a true understanding of the local vernacular, will be constructed using traditional materials and techniques.

We propose a clearly contemporary architecture rooted in the building history of the area and inspired directly by the spare, brick-faced, generously-glazed, open-plan and stripped classical 19th century industrial architecture of Spitalfields, Shoreditch and Hoxton.

Our approach respects the existing buildings and permits them to retain flexibility of use.

Our focus will be on providing a wide variety of spaces suiting many kinds of businesses of different scales, including tech industries, that can deliver jobs for local people, and increasing the amount of housing, including affordable housing.
